THE CAMINO PILGRIMAGE

The Camino Pilgrimage is an intimate cohort for dominant culture male faith leaders who are seeking wholeness (peace) in their identity, vocation, and leadership. We trust that tending to this deep, internal work will directly impact how we embody equity, justice, and peace in our unique contexts of leadership. We will create space for peers who want to do the good, hard, slow work of confronting conflicts within ourselves that inhibit our ability to lead more equitably and collaboratively. We will have elders to guide our learning, and the journey will culminate with a pilgrimage on the Camino de Santiago.

Tuition: \$2500

PAST & PRESENT FACULTY OF ELDERS

A central conviction of this cohort is that dominant-culture men need to "do our own work" as a path toward leading more equitably and collaboratively. Many of our female and POC colleagues have asked us to create a space for these men (mostly white) to confront issues of ego, whiteness, and patriarchy as a way to honor the women and POC who often are forced to absorb our journey of discovery at their expense. It is with that conviction that we have primarily invited white male elders to guide us in this work. These are elders who have modeled an integrated "second half of life" and faith we can learn from in regard to identity, vocation, and leadership. In addition, there are POC elders who have served as advisors to the construction of this cohort and who are committed to accompanying dominant culture men toward wholeness.



- Opening Retreat in San Diego
 - · Gather to have fun, built trust and begin our shared Camino
- Monthly Virtual Gatherings
 - · Learn from the Faculty of Elders
 - Peer-processing and reflection
- Pilgrimage on the Camino de Santiago
 - 8-day guided journey
 - Portugal and Spain
- Guided reflection, ongoing support, and next steps
 - Peer groups meet two weeks between our virtual stage gatherings
 - Common reading and practices between stage gatherings
- Personal coaching session
- · Ongoing community beyond the cohort for sustained integration and practice
 - Alumni from past years will likely gather in-person on an annual/bi-annual basis
